



Sporting Centre of Excellence

Work will commence on the development of the state-of-the-art, hockey specific all-weather pitch this March adding to Kilgraston's already extensive sporting facilities. Planning for the project was submitted at the end of 2009 and it is hoped that the pitch will become the home of Perthshire hockey and a training centre for elite players from across Scotland. To complement the new pitch, Kilgraston will also undertake a complete refurbishment of the all-weather tennis facilities to provide eight championship courts.

Director of Sport, Pauline Stott, hopes the new facilities can be used to attract more people to sport and can be utilised in the expansion of grass-roots hockey and tennis across Perthshire and beyond.

The exciting £0.5 million development should be ready by the end of June and will become a Centre of Excellence for Hockey and Tennis.



Director of Music performs "The Flower of Scotland"

Kilgraston's Director of Music, Andrew McGarva, performed "The Flower of Scotland" in front of 70,000 football fans as they gathered to watch the Scotland national football team play Japan in the Nissan Stadium, Yokohama on Saturday the 10th of October 2009. Andrew arrived at Kilgraston after two years living and working in Japan as the Head of Music at the British School in Tokyo. While he was there he performed at numerous high-profile events, his most recent being as Musical Director and Conductor of the Tokyo Philharmonic Orchestra for a gala concert to celebrate links between Japan and Scotland as part of UK Japan 150 and 'Homecoming Scotland'.

On returning to Scotland last summer to take up the post of Director of Music at Kilgraston, Andrew was contacted by the Japan Scotland society to ask if he would be interested in returning to Japan and performing Flower of Scotland at the beginning of the match. After the performance Andrew said 'It was a terrifying but rewarding experience and the sound of the Tartan army singing along with me was a great boost to my confidence. The response from the Japanese crowd was fantastic.'



Top of the League

Last year's Upper Sixth Advanced Higher results have been recognised as the best in Scotland (The Scotsman 2009, BestSchools.co.uk).

Out of the top four schools, three were single sex girls' schools. Current Chair of the Scottish Girls' Schools Association, Mike Farmer (Kilgraston Principal) commented that; 'Just as in England, Scottish single sex girls' schools dominate the league tables and this is yet more evidence of the advantages of this form of education. Whilst one should be wary of examination statistics, it is particularly pleasing to note that the Kilgraston girls are top yet again'.

A Young Girl with a Big Heart

Three year old Sophie Cuthill, who attends the Nursery at Kilgraston, was the youngest person ever to complete the Cancer Research UK Dundee Race for Life last May; and she raised an incredible £ 4,500 in memory of her uncle Anthony Lang who recently died from a brain tumour.



Linda's Dream Takes to the Stage

The dream of the late Linda Marshall, former Head of Music at Kilgraston, who sadly died in 2008, came true last November when Kilgraston pupils put on a spectacular musical in her memory.



Roald Dahl's "The Twits" had long been a family favourite of Linda's and she had always wanted to devise a musical based on the story. She began adapting the story as she battled against cancer, but those closest to her refused

to let the dream die along with her. Last November, twelve months after her death "The Monkey's Revenge" began its two-night run with Linda's daughter Libby playing a star role.

Bringing the piece to life was at times a heart wrenching process and the Roald Dahl Foundation after initially refusing permission for it to be staged agreed that for two nights only the show could go on. Joan Blue, a former colleague of Linda's who collaborated on the show insisted that it had all been worth it. Following both performances a retiring collection in Linda's memory was held and £2498.25 was raised in support of Marie Curie Cancer Care. A cheque was presented by Libby Marshall to Jackie Johnston, a community fundraiser from Marie Curie on the 22nd of February after she gave an assembly to the whole school on the outstanding care which is provided by their nurses to cancer patients across the UK.

Inchcolm Purchase Pigs

Last December, the girls from Inchcolm House decided to raise some money to show their dedication to this year's social awareness goal and bring their house mascot to life! They held a coffee morning and all donated money to a fund which raised enough to buy 3 pigs to make a difference to the lives of women in Bolivia. Pig rearing initiatives can help give women in poverty stricken areas an opportunity to make a living and provide for their families.

Geography Fieldtrips

Three U6 students studying Geography at Advanced Higher went to Tentsmuir in October last year to collect coastal data for their coursework investigation. The sun was shining and 5 hours of data collection later the staff and girls had accomplished their goal. They collected information on wind speed, slope gradient, percentage vegetation cover and diversity, identification of species using quadrants, pH and moisture content of soil to name but a few techniques.

Three U6 and 23 Standard Grade students in the L5 went to Perth to conduct an urban study as part of their syllabus. The L5 put into practise the data collecting techniques they had been learning in class and the U6 gathered fieldwork data as evidence for their Unit 1 assessment. Both year groups interviewed the public using questionnaires, conducted environmental and land use survey and counted traffic and pedestrians. The coffee stop was a welcome break by all – any excuse for a Geographer to incorporate food into learning!





Kilgraston Girls Gain a Taste of Life as a Business Leader

The Sixth Form pupils were given the opportunity to experience the life of a busy business executive by taking part in a series of tasks organised by BusinessDynamics, a registered educational charity that aims to bring business to life for students. The pupils took part in a series of presentations and workshops led by people from the world of industry and commerce, all of which involved practical activity. These sessions included preparing a press release for an advertising campaign, building radio controlled rescue robots and a town planning exercise for the design and construction of a new housing complex.

Speaking afterwards, Kilgraston's Head of Sixth Form, Elaine Prentice said "The purpose behind the programme was to give our pupils an understanding of why it is so important for them to develop the core employability skills such as team leading, communication and interpersonal skills that are so crucial if they are to gain good jobs when they leave full-time education. By the end of the two days the girls commented that they felt more confident at public speaking and being a leader as well as understanding the need to work within tight deadlines. The programme really helped the girls to think about what direction they wish to follow when leaving school in less than a year's time. I am really grateful to the seminar leaders all of whom spent a lot of time from their normal busy schedules to help make the two day event so successful".

Music

Last term was a very busy one for the Music department with an excellent St. Cecilia's Concert in November, followed by the Lily Procession and end of term services. In addition to all of these events the girls performed extensively in the local community. The Madrigal Group sang in Edinburgh at St. Kentigern's and in December travelled to Glasgow where they performed in Princes' Square underneath the Christmas tree to raise money for the Hansel Foundation. The Prep School Nativity was performed to the Perth Chest, Heart & Stroke Victims unit and a number of Senior Girls sang in Perth City Centre to raise money for Save the Children.
